Welcome to the latest edition of RE:PORT. This is our new quarterly community newsletter.



COMMERCIAL DIRECTOR
AT THE PORT OF TILBURY

Peter started in the port industry in 1983 as an operative for a grain export handling business and has worked his way up to become the Commercial Director of the Port.

Peter is responsible for the grain terminal and bulk commodities, including the Port's large operating tenant customers. Peter also deals with the internal electrical network and wind turbines that make Tilbury Britain's greenest port, and leads the Tilbury2 project, which is the proposed large land expansion to the east of the Port.

Peter lives locally and is an active governor at Gateway Academy, sits on the Thurrock Business Board and is very much engaged with the local community.



The first stage of seeking the views of the local community on the Tilbury2 proposals is complete. This will be followed by a further formal consultation in June. At each stage, the views of the community will be used to finalise the proposals before an application is made for development consent later in 2017.





02. THE LOGISTICSTRAINING ACADEMY



The Logistics Academy is renowned locally for its considerable input in supporting initiatives in the development of careers advice and skills development programmes. The Port of Tilbury Logistics Academy team sit on advisory boards and attend community events to promote the transport and logistics industry.

The Port is a great advocate of local jobs for local people and are always looking at ways in which they can train local people into the jobs on offer at the Port. Recently, the Port has been working with Job Centre Plus to run the Access 2 Logistics programme.

The Logistics Academy also runs an internal programme to support its employees to become governors of local schools. This has been a great way to work with local schools from careers advice to supply chain assistance and recruitment.

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04. TILBURYON THE THAMES

Tilbury on the Thames Trust was set up last year with a clear focus to restore and celebrate the Grade II* Cruise Terminal complex, an architectural gateway on the Thames with cultural significance for trade, military and migration.

Working collaboratively with the Port, the Trust blends community and commercial uses to safeguard the heritage of the terminal for future generations. Local people will form part of the story through leisure and education opportunities that anchor the Cruise Terminal complex within our community, whilst positioning it as a tourism hub for the wider region.

With the full support of the Port and the Royal British Legion, Tilbury on the Thames has been awarded a Libor Grant Commitment of £750,000 to develop a bursary and training scheme for Armed Forces veterans and their families within logistics at the Port.

Our programme for a veteran focused training and bursary scheme will ensure that those who represent the best of values - our ex-servicemen and women - form a central part in the delivery of first class training alongside maintaining our heritage buildings and developing community engagement and activity.

Lower Thames Crossing...

The Port welcomes the recent Lower Thames Crossing announcement and will continue to make the case for a junction for Tilbury as this is progressed through the Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects planning process. The Port's plans for expansion at Tilbury 2 are an entirely separate process and they do not rely on the Lower Thames Crossing.

05. PORTOPERATIONS

GRAIN TERMINAL

The grain terminal at the Port is the largest in the UK, with 120,000 tonnes in capacity and an expansion is planned to increase this to 136,000 tonnes. 17.2% of the UK milling capacity comes through the grain terminal at Tilbury.

Next time you are shopping and spot Kingsmill, Warburtons and Burgen on your local supermarket shelves, it's good to know that the key ingredients have made their way through a first class automated and storage process at the Port before ending up as a slice of toast on your plate or a sandwich for lunch!



Did you know?

The Port of Tilbury is part of Capital Cruising, the Forth Ports brand that is a union of cruise terminals in London and Scotland, giving passengers an unrivalled opportunity to see the biggest sights of the UK's two major capital cities - London and Edinburgh. Capital Cruising offers a unique capital city connection because we own two of the most strategically located ports in Europe: London International Cruise Terminal based at Port of Tilbury and our ports at Leith and Rosyth that give direct access into Edinburgh, Scotland's capital city.



LONDON INTERNATIONAL CRUISE TERMINAL

London's only deep water cruise facility is right here in the Port of Tilbury. Because of its proximity to London, at only 22 nautical miles away, it is ideally placed for tourists heading into Tilbury then central London. Despite the modern ships that dock at the Port, the Cruise Terminal speaks of history as a Grade II listed building. The terminal is expected to welcome over 100,000 cruise visitors this year.

06. IN THE COMMUNITY

The Port knows how important it is to support young people and encourage them into sport, it gives them great life skills. Tilbury supports local football, rugby and swimming clubs.

The Port opened its doors to the local community, in conjunction with Estuary 2016 the Art, Film and Literature festival run by Metal. Hundreds of people took the opportunity to take free Thames Clipper boat and vintage bus rides to view the Port from a different perspective including a visitor who is 99 and worked in the Port as a young man.

It was a great opportunity for our younger visitors to see some of the large port machines, put on mini high vis vests and passes whilst finding out what goes on in the Port.



The Port of Tilbury Police is the oldest police force in the UK and is a small, specialised police force responsible for policing the Port 24 hours a day. 07. A LITTLE BIT OF HISTORY



In a letter from the Prime Minister Attlee to an MP about immigration to the UK, he said:

"145 had actually been placed in employment by the 30th June and the number still resident in the shelter at this last week-end was down to 76. It would therefore be a great mistake to regard these people as undesirable or unemployables. The majority of them are honest workers, who can make a genuine contribution to our labour difficulties at the present time."

On 22nd June 1948 at Tilbury Docks, 492 Caribbean migrants stepped off the SS Empire Windrush and into their new lives in Britain.

They had been persuaded by an advert in the 'Daily Gleaner' newspaper, which offered transport to Britain for those who wanted guaranteed work. These men and women, many of whom were ex-service men, were the first wave of migration of workers after the war. One of the passengers included Sam King who went on to become mayor of Southwark, and Euton Christian who became the first black magistrate in Britain. Evelyn Wauchope wrote a celebratory song on his arrival in Tilbury.

Although there was backlash towards this increased migration into the country, many marked the 22nd June 1948 as a special event. It was the beginning of a new Great Britain, perhaps even changing what it means to be British itself.

The British born relatives of those original passengers coined the term 'The Windrush Generation'. The name is used to describe those who first docked in Tilbury on the Empire Windrush as well as extending all the way to the future generations of those passengers' family trees. This name has stuck around for almost 70 years and proves that the 22nd June 1948 has become an important day in British history.
